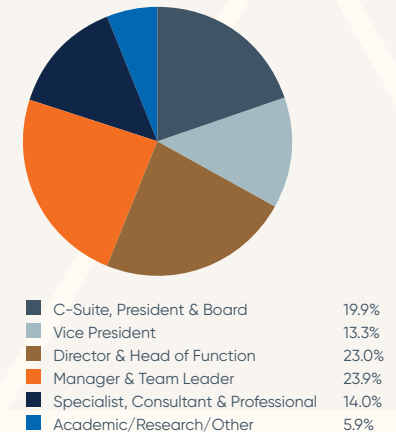

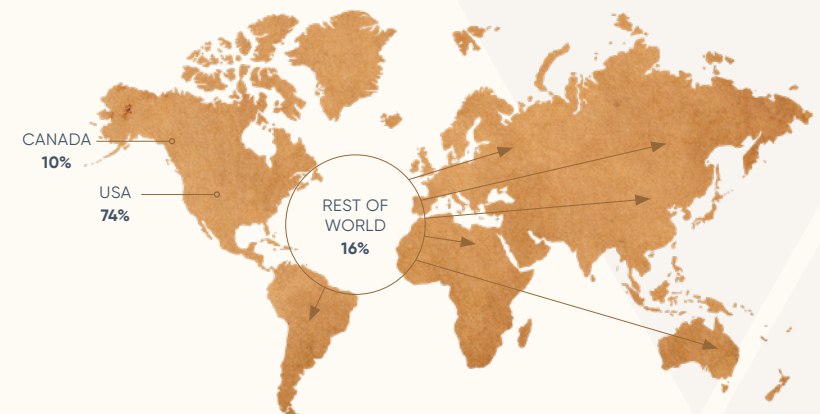

FOUR DAYS IN SAVANNAH

Tuesday May 11

The Benchmarking Forum (half day)

Eight best-in-class organizations open their unpublished practice in a structured, rotational exchange. Capped and sold by seat. Followed by the Welcome Reception.

Wednesday May 12

The Plenary Day

One stage, one conversation, walking the five Edges in sequence, with five voices deliberately balanced: Executive, Association, Professional, Industry and Academia. Evening: conference dinner and the SOTE Awards.

Thursday May 13

The Concurrent Sessions

Four parallel streams – Leadership, Culture & Organization; Human Performance & Behavioral Sciences; Risk, Process Engineering & Technology; and the National Safety Council Sessions – each closing with a Hot Topic Debates hour. The day ends with the Closing Plenary, where the Forum's year-ahead commitments and the progress of the Industry Bridge are announced.

Friday May 14

Professional Development Seminars (half day)

Four CEU-credited, small-group masterclasses led by the Forum's headline experts. Groups are capped; registered delegates choose first. The Forum closes at 13:00.

Webinars and the SOTE Virtual Conference bring the Forum's thinkers to the profession worldwide, between the days in May.

Not a lecture. Not a panel. A working session.

Before the conference officially opens, eight leading corporations come together – not to present polished case studies from a stage, but to show how they actually work. Delegates rotate through interactive rooms in small groups, moving beyond presentations into real dialogue, comparison and shared insight, and building cross-industry relationships before the conference begins.

This is structured, peer-to-peer benchmarking for leaders who want ideas they can use.

In each of four rooms, the host company presents a live topic – an innovative safety intervention, a risk-management practice, a culture transformation program, a technology implementation, a learning model. Mixed groups from different companies question, challenge, compare and contribute. After the break, teams re-mix and four new hosts open their doors.

- Small-room access to real safety practices from leading organizations
- Direct comparison of innovative interventions, risk-management approaches and culture transformation
- Practical discussion of technology, learning and improvement models
- Mixed-group rotations: question, challenge, compare and contribute
- Cross-industry relationships built before the main conference begins

Who's in the room

The program is limited to eight host corporations to protect depth, confidentiality and high-quality interaction. Seats are capped, sold by seat, and will not be released beyond the cap.

In 2026 the rooms belonged to Caterpillar, Nike, Pernod Ricard, Procter & Gamble, Siemens, Southern Company, Tesla and Xylem – the Forum where Tesla and P&G compared notes on what actually works.

The 2027 Benchmarking Eight are revealed one company at a time from December 2026.

Four days of hard questions and better answers about risk — set among the moss-draped squares of America's most walkable, most storied, most surprising city.

A city built on a plan — and famous for breaking the mold

Laid out in 1733 around a grid of public squares, Savannah is one of the great deliberate designs in urban history: 22 leafy squares survive today, each a small forest of live oaks and Spanish moss ringed by antebellum mansions and ironwork balconies.

It is a city that rewards walking — the entire Historic District, one of the largest in the United States, unfolds at street level between the Forum's sessions. Hotels, venues, restaurants and the riverfront all sit within a pleasant stroll under the oaks.

For a Forum devoted to thinking differently about risk, there is no better backdrop: a city that planned for order, then built its character on charm, eccentricity and a healthy disregard for convention.

Easy to reach, easy to walk, easy to love

Savannah/Hilton Head International Airport (SAV) sits about 20 minutes from the Historic District, with direct connections to major US hubs. Once in town, delegates barely need a vehicle.
